

What to visit in Bidart: A guide for holidaymakers

Introduction

Bidart is a charming coastal village in the Basque Country, located between Biarritz and Saint-Jean-de-Luz. The church was built in the 16th century and renovated in the 19th century, and it contains some remarkable artworks, such as the altarpiece, the organ and the stained glass windows. You can also admire the old washhouse, the mill, the chapel of Saint-Joseph and the cemetery, where some famous personalities are buried, such as the poet Paul-Jean Toulet and the singer Luis Mariano. The museum of the sea, located in the former town hall, displays a collection of objects and documents related to the maritime history of Bidart and the Basque Country. You can learn about the fishing, whaling, smuggling and shipbuilding activities that shaped the

identity of the village. If you want to experience the festive spirit of Bidart, you can attend some of its events, such as the patron saint's day, the Basque pelota tournaments, the Basque choir concerts, the dance shows and the gastronomic fairs.

What to do in Bidart when it rains

Even if Bidart is known for its sunny weather, it can sometimes rain, especially in winter and spring. But don't worry, there are still plenty of things to do in Bidart when it rains. You can take advantage of the indoor facilities, such as the cinema, the library, the spa, the bowling alley or the escape room.
